I have been an advocate locally in the Edmonton and surrounding communities helping residents, agfieldmen, and regulators with identifying and control of regulated weeds, including other invasive species (wild boar, whirling disease etc) that I personally encounter. I assist with awareness and provide guidance and direction where possible, and refer to various AISC resources available to our membership and general public.

I come from an agriculture (dairy) background and studied agriculture (B.Sc in Agriculture – minor in animal science, P.Ag), working for an applied agricultural research non-profit group (Gateway Research Organization) in my early career, and still enjoy working with farmers,

agfieldmen and regulators throughout the central Alberta region on crop production, weed control, erosion and conservation farming.

Currently in am a environmental and regulatory team lead and a consulting form (WSP – formerly Wood), working with various existing clients including cities, municipalities, governments (Alberta Transportation), oil and gas, solar, and other private companies. Where possible I enjoy working on integrated pest management programs and assist in awareness. I have been an invited speaker to conferences on regulatory and technical weed invasive species management issues, and guest lecturer for university of Alberta plant science courses, and really enjoy mentoring young professionals.

With a lifelong career in agriculture, I have always been exposed to the impact of invasives species on livelihoods, the soil and the environment. All of this related directly to AISC and its activities. Through these professional as well as voluntary activities, I have developed linkages, connections, experience over a wide variety of disciplines impacted by invasive species. Recently with GRO we have been able to:

- help arrange and support research into expansion of herbicide registrations on specific invasives,
- support college activities as they study in a course dedicated to the identification and eradication of listed noxious and prohibited weed species,
- raise awareness of serious species and their concerns to Summer Villages and their associations. These villages are often on the forefront of the war against a variety of invasive species of all types, anf
- support awareness of the biocontrol program and help folks make connections with this program.

As past president of the AISC I am very proud of its continued development and expansion. I support its efforts in continuing to raise awareness of vertebrate pests such as wild boar at large, prohibited and noxious weeds, and the impact of invasive biota on soils.

As a supporter of summer village life, awareness efforts have been made to increase awareness of various programs relation to invasives as it pertains to lakeside living.
